Mr. Keane asked about the extension of the second floor above the sidewalk. He asked how high and how far it extended. The applicant stated that the second floor would extend three feet forward of the building front and be twelve feet above the sidewalk.

Discussion continued regarding structural materials and the color palette.

Mr. Keane expressed a concern for losing the whole of the brick wall to a mural. Discussion followed.

Mr. Jones asked for anyone else wishing to speak in favor of the application. There were none. He asked for anyone wishing to speak against the application. there were none.

Mr. Jones then asked for a motion on the application.

Mr. Abbott moved to approve the application; Mr. Barnes seconded the motion. Mr. Jones noted that the intervening property worked to maintain the historic brick appearance.

Mr. Abbott noted that the intervening property did work to maintain a historic look, while the property across Main street was maintaining a wall with an historic mural. He stated that the additional mural would help break up the blandness of the area and improve its park-like appearance.

Mr. Keane expressed interest in maintaining the unpainted brick on the upper half of the wall. Discussion on the appearance of the mural and the brick wall continued. Mr. Butterbaugh noted that the efforts to maintain the intervening building were intentional because of its history and that the wall on his property was not of the same caliber as the other building. He further stated that since it was not his building, he would be reticent to do any restoration to it.

Mr. Barnes stated that the branding of the mural would enhance the property and the business.

Mr. Jones noted that the building had been painted previously and so the issue had nuance. He asked that the applicant come back with additional proposals.

The applicant asked whether the board could vote on painting in general and then revisiting the image. Mr. Jones stated that he would not wish to consider such a proposal.

Mr. Jones asked for a vote. Mr. Abbott and Mr. Barnes voted in favor. Mr. Keane and Mr. Jones voted against.

With a tie, Mr. Jones asked for the applicants to provide additional options from the applicants. Mr. Barnes asked when they would be asked back to present. CITY OF SENECA ORDINANCE NO. 2021-08

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF SENECA FOR ITS FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2022, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF TAXES TO GENERATE REVENUES REQUIRED FOR THE BUDGET.

NOW, THEREFORE, upon motion of City Council, and BY SENECA CITY COUNCIL, in Council duly assembled, and with a quorum present and voting, BE IT ORDAINED:

Section 1: Recitals

The City Council of the City of Seneca, as an incorporated municipality of the State of South Carolina, is authorized to adopt a budget and to levy taxes to defray the cost of operation of the City's business, as provided by Section 5-7-260, Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976), as amended, and by Chapter 2, Article I, Section 21-46, Ordinances of the City of Seneca.

Section 2: Budget Adopted

The proposed Budget for the City of Seneca for its fiscal year ending June 30, 2022 and the estimated revenues required to effect the same, which is documented in the General Fund Budget Workshop Proposed Budget for the fiscal year 2021, filed and kept in the City of Seneca's Finance office, and incorporated herein in its entirety by reference, is hereby adopted.

Section 3: Levy of Taxes

To defray the costs of operation of the City of Seneca for its fiscal year of July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022, according to the Budget hereby adopted, a tax to receive ad valorem tax for real property within the City of Seneca, in the amount of One Million Nine Hundred Sixty-Six Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-Eight and no/100 (\$1,966,698.00) Dollars. SIXTY-TWO POINT SEVEN (62.7) MILLS IS HEREBY LEVIED, however upon reassessment values becoming available, tax mills may be readjusted. Said tax levied is in value of all real estate and personal property of every description and kind owned and used within the corporate limits of the City of Seneca which is subject to taxation under the rules and regulations of the County of Oconee and the State of South Carolina, excluding only such property as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of the state of South Carolina. Such taxes shall be collected in the manner hereinafter provided, and be paid into the treasury of the City and used to pay current expenses as the same shall come due according to the Budget.

Section 4: Method of Levy and Collection

The taxes hereby levied, together with any penalties thereon permitted bylaw, shall be billed and collected pursuant to the provisions of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976) as amended, by the Treasurer of Oconee County, and remitted to the treasury of the City of Seneca for disposition pursuant to the provisions of Section 3 hereof.

Section 5: Delinquent Taxes

The Oconee County Tax Collector shall be responsible for the collection of any delinquent taxes, pursuant to contract and agreement between the City of Seneca and Oconee County.

Section 6: Budget Administration

The incumbent and duly elected Mayor of the City of Seneca shall be charged with the administration of the Budget and the revenues collected to defray the same. The City Administrator shall be charged to handle the day-to-day administration of the Budget and shall be authorized to transfer funds, as necessary, within the Budget so far as the total amount of the Budget does not differ from what was previously approved by the Mayor and City Council.

Section 7: Severability

Invalidation of any provision hereof, or any portion of any provision hereof, by judgment or Court Order, shall in no wise affect any of the other provisions hereof, which shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 8: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective upon second and final reading, as indicated below.

Section 9: Budget Provisos

The budget provisos attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein, by reference, as fully as if set forth verbatim herein, and adopted as part of this Ordinance.

Section 1: State and Local Grants for Specified Purposes

The City of Seneca receives federal, state and local grants for specified purposes. The City of Seneca is hereby authorized, absent any other factor, to apply for, receive, and expend all such grants for which no local match is required or for which such funds are budgeted herein, in addition to all other authority elsewhere given, and in accordance with all other policies and directives of the City of Seneca. These grants, including any local match, are deemed budgeted for the specified purposes upon acceptance of such grants. These grants are budgeted for on a project basis in accordance with the grantors' terms and conditions instead of an annual basis and, as such, unexpended appropriations for uncompleted grant projects are carried forward as a part of the budget authorized by this Ordinance.

City of Seneca, South Carolina Resolution Establishing a Policy Guideline for the justification of the transfer from the Light and Water Fund to the General Fund

WHEREAS, the City of Seneca, South Carolina has traditionally made operating transfers from the Light & Water Fund to the General Fund, and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to continue the competitiveness of the utility system and to justify the General Fund's need for Light and Water Fund transfers to a level supportable by current utility business practices, and

WHEREAS, if utility services had been provided by a privately-owned utility instead of the City's publicly owned utility, such utility would have paid municipal ad valorem taxes and a franchise fee to the General Fund of the City and the utility's investors would have been entitled to a return on their investment,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City of Seneca, South Carolina, that the following policy guideline regarding franchise fees, payments in lieu of taxes, rates of return and operating transfers from the Light and Water Fund is hereby adopted:

Section 1. Gross Receipts Business Tax. The City shall budget annually a gross receipts business tax from the Light and Water Fund that equals the franchise fee that would have been paid had electric, water and sewer services been provided by an investor-owned utility. The gross receipts business tax shall be calculated by multiplying all budgeted gross revenue of the Light and Water Fund by the current franchise fee of 5%. The gross receipts business tax shall be reported as an expense of the electric, water and sewer system and as a revenue of the General Fund. ($$34,875,500 \times 0.05 = $1,743,775$)

Section 2. Payment in Lieu of Taxes. The City shall budget annually a payment in lieu of taxes from the Light and Water Fund to the General Fund that approximates the amount of ad valorem taxes that would have been paid had utility services been provided by an investor-owned utility. The payment in lieu of taxes shall be calculated by multiplying the gross fixed assets of the system reported in the City's most recent audited financial statements by the appropriate assessment ratio and then by the City and County-wide tax rate. The payment in lieu of taxes amount calculated under this section shall be reported as an expense of the Light and Water Fund and as a revenue of the General Fund.

 $(\$107,246,687, \times 0.105 = \$11,260,902 \times 0.2876 = \$3,238,635)$

Section 3. Operating Grant. The City may budget an annual operating grant on the gross operational revenues of the Light and Water Fund. This operating grant will be based on 0.55% of gross utility revenues and may be adjusted by City Council. The operating grant amount calculated under this section shall be reported as an expense of the Light and Water fund and as a revenue of the General Fund. ($$34,875,500 \times 0.0005044 = $17,590$)

Section 4. Transfers from the Light and Water Fund for the purchase of capital equipment will be considered a capital grant. This amount shall be reported as an expense of the Light and Water Fund and as a revenue of the General Fund.

Section 5. Exceptions. The amount to be paid from the Light and Water Fund under this resolution may be increased or reduced upon approval of the City Council.

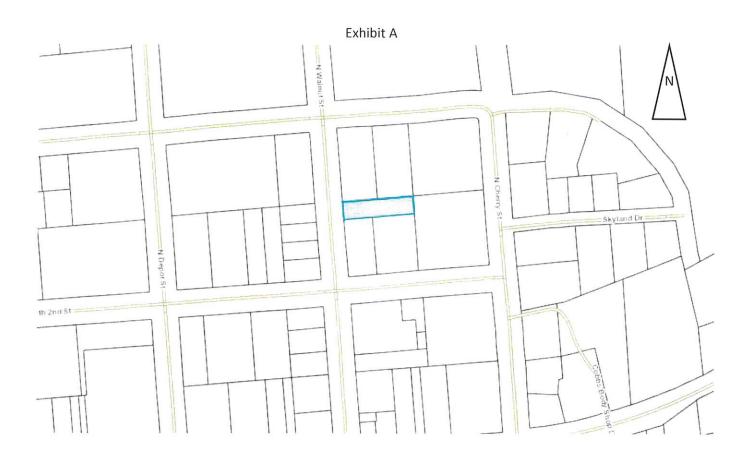

CONTRACT FOR TRANSIT SERVICES BETWEEN CITY OF SENECA AND AND CITY OF CLEMSON/CLEMSON AREA TRANSIT

This Contract is made and entered into between the City of Clemson / Clemson Area Transit with offices located at 200 West Lane, Clemson, SC (hereinafter referred to as "City of Clemson" or "Contractor") and the City of Seneca, 221 E North First Street, PO Box 4773, Seneca, SC 29679 (hereinafter referred to as "City of Seneca").

1. Contract Term

This Contract shall commence on the date that this Contract is fully executed under authorization granted by the City of Seneca at its City Council meeting and will remain in effect July 1, 2021 until June 30, 2022 (the "Contract Term"), with the option of an annual renewal each of the two years following for a possible term of five years, unless earlier terminated, as provided herein. This will be the second renewal and year three of the five year term allowed.

2. Termination

Contractor (City of Clemson) may terminate this contract by written notice of termination in the event the City of Seneca fails to perform any obligation of the City of Seneca under this contract. Contractor will continue to provide transportation services no more than ninety (90) days from the date of the written notice of termination to the City of Seneca. The City of Seneca agrees to pay Contractor for transportation services under the payment schedule of this contract through the last day transportation services are provided by Contractor.

The City of Seneca may terminate this contract with ninety (90) days written notice of termination if any issue is brought to the Contractor and resolution of that issue cannot be agreed upon between the City of Seneca and Contractor within ten days, or such longer period as the City of Seneca may authorize. Additionally, if funding from federal, state, or other sources is not sufficient, as determined by the City of Seneca, to allow for the continuation of services during the indicated term, the City of Seneca shall give six (6) months' notice to the City of Clemson.

3. Insurance

The City of Clemson will purchase adequate vehicle insurance for all vehicles and will provide the City of Seneca with proof of the insurance coverages provided under the applicable policy. A certificate of insurance will be provided to the City of Seneca prior to the commencement of the operation of a transit vehicle pursuant to this agreement. The

premium for this insurance will be paid out of the transit account maintained by the City of Clemson.

4. Assignability

Contractor shall not assign or transfer all or any part of its interest in this contract without the prior written approval of the City of Seneca.

5. Force Majeure

Neither the City of Seneca nor the City of Clemson shall be liable in damages or have a right to terminate this contract for any delay or default in performance hereunder if such delay or default is caused by conditions beyond its control including, but not limited to, Acts of God, government restrictions or limitations, wars, insurrections and/or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the party whose performance is affected.

6. General Management

The Contractor shall provide for all driver(s), as well as the maintenance and management of the same, to operate buses for the City of Seneca. The City of Clemson's designated supervisor shall be readily available for contact by the City of Seneca representatives to address issues or concerns.

Rider discipline exercised by the Contractor will be guided by the City of Clemson and City of Seneca policies.

7. Use of City of Seneca Bus Maintenance Facility:

The City of Seneca will grant the use of its Bus Maintenance Facility to the City of Clemson free of charge. The utility cost (excluding electrical costs assigned to the bus chargers) and all related maintenance of these facilities will be paid for by City of Seneca. The City of Seneca buses will also be housed at said facility, with the exception of the Express Route bus, which will be housed overnight at the City of Clemson CATbus Facility.

The City of Clemson shall maintain at its own expense insurance coverages, including, but not limited to, Worker's Compensation, General Liability, and Property insurance, related to the operations conducted by the City of Clemson personnel and for City of Clemson personal property on the premises.

The City of Seneca shall maintain at its own expense insurance coverages, including, but not limited to, Worker's Compensation, General Liability, and Property insurance, related to the operations conducted by the City of Seneca personnel, the structure, improvements, and any City of Seneca personal property on the premises.

8. Routes

The Contractor, working in cooperation with City of Seneca representative(s), shall establish routes and schedules. Time schedules and routes will be arranged and adjusted as necessary by the Contractor after discussion with the designated representative(s) of the City of Seneca. Reasonable and infrequent late arrivals or departures resulting from unexpected delays and mechanical failure will not be considered a breach of contract.

Contractor will maintain contact with the drivers with a two-way radio system or another form of communication.

Contractor will maintain an accurate record of miles per bus per route, per day. The Contractor will attempt to maintain accurate record of passengers per route, per day.

9. Vehicle and Maintenance Requirements

Contractor will maintain at Contractor's expense maintenance services on the City of Seneca buses to be used by Contractor to perform this contract. Notwithstanding this provision, in the event of Seneca overhead chargers requiring replacement parts with an individual part cost exceeding \$3,000, or in the event of Seneca buses requiring battery pack replacements, the City of Seneca will be responsible for the cost of such parts or battery replacement(s). Contractor will provide an experienced Electric Bus Maintenance Technician (mechanic) to work at the City of Seneca Bus Maintenance Facility who shall work exclusively on the City of Seneca buses and chargers. Contractor will maintain accurate records of all maintenance services according to the requirements of SC DOT and FTA standards. Contractor will maintain the insurances on City of Seneca buses pursuant to Section 3, above.

The City of Seneca will provide Contractor with all buses to be used by Contractor to perform this contract. Contractor will maintain insurance on City of Seneca buses pursuant to Section 3, above. In the event a Contractor owned bus is used to perform under this contract, Contractor will maintain insurance on any such Contractor owned bus pursuant to Section 3, above.

The electrical costs (fuel) for the City of Seneca buses used to perform this contract will be paid for by the City of Clemson.

10. Driver Requirements Qualifications:

Only drivers of the highest quality from the standpoint of safe operation and relationship with passengers shall be hired as bus drivers. All drivers will hold the appropriate license and endorsements. All drivers must be qualified and meet any and all other federal and state statutory and regulatory requirements.

Training: Contractor shall be responsible for training of drivers. Training includes, but is not limited to: laws, rules and regulations of public transit bus driving, pre-trip inspection procedures, regulatory requirements, bus driving techniques, and accident procedures.

Drivers will also be responsible for a working knowledge of the procedures for handling passenger situations that might arise (disruptive, intoxicated/under the influence, medical, etc.).

11. Fees And Expenses Invoice And Payment Terms:

Contractor will invoice the City of Seneca on a monthly basis for services provided under this Contract. Invoice will identify type and amount of service hours (Normal Route Service, Special Event, Paratransit, etc.). Payment from the City of Seneca is due and payable within fifteen (15) days of receipt of invoice.

Fees: The fees for Contractor's services under this Contract (the "Fees") will be \$75.00 per service hour of normal bus operation. Fees for Contractor's services under this Contract for Special Event services will be \$75.00 per service hour. Fees for Paratransit services by the Contractor provided to the City of Seneca will be \$75.00 per service hour.

12. Option to Renew

The City of Seneca and the City of Clemson agree to meet by April 30 of each year the contract is in force to negotiate an extension of one year and any rate changes to the Contract. This Contract may be renewed for an additional term of one year, annually, up to two additional times. This will be the second renewal of the contract and year three of the five-year term allowed. Per SC DOT regulations, the City of Seneca must then bid out the services anew upon the expiration of the allowed five-year term.

13. Indemnification

To the fullest extent allowed by law, the City of Clemson will and does hereby agree to protect, indemnify, and defend the City of Seneca and its respective affiliated enterprises, officers, employees, Trustees, representative, agents, and assigns from and against all damages, losses, liens, causes of action, suits, judgements, expenses, and other claims of any nature, kind, or description by any entity or person resulting from the operation of Clemson Area Transit under the performance of this agreement through the procurement of and coverages offered by general liability insurance, public official liability, automobile and bus, worker's compensation, excess liability insurance coverage, and any other insurance endorsements that serve to protect the City of Clemson and its CATbus partners.

14. Governing Law and Jurisdiction

This Contract shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws in the State of South Carolina, without regard to its principles of conflict of laws. The Parties consent

to exclusive jurisdiction of the federal and state courts of the State of South Carolina for all disputes arising out of this Contract.

Contractor shall comply with the requirements of SC Department of Transportation and FTA regarding public transit and transit vehicles.

15. Modification

No waiver, alteration, or modification of any of the provisions of this contract shall be binding upon any party unless in writing and signed by the authorized representative of the party against whom such waiver, alteration, or modification is sought to be enforced. Each such amendment, waiver or discharge will be effective only in the specific instance and for the specific purpose for which given.

16. Entire Contract

This Contract shall constitute the entire contract between the Parties and supersede any prior understandings between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof.
